A BRIEF HISTORY OF BURNHAM FOOTBALL CLUB

Founded in 1878, <u>Burnham Football Club</u> is the second oldest club Buckinghamshire. We played in the early years, with considerable success, in various leagues, before joining the Great Western Combination in 1948. We moved to the Wycombe Combination in 1964 and then spent one season (1970/71) in the Reading Combination. In 1971 the club was elected to the Hellenic League. Winning both the Premier Division and League Cup in 1975/76. We were also twice beaten finalists in the League Cup too.

In 1977 the club were elected to the Athenian League and were twice runners-up before the league folded in 1984. We competed in the London Spartan League in 1984/85. Winning both the Premier Division title and the League Cup.

The summer of 1985 bought about the amalgamation of the football club with Hillingdon Borough FC, who had lost their ground and were about to fold. We played in the Southern League as Burnham & Hillingdon FC and reverted back to the former name of Burnham FC in 1987. Season 1994/95 saw us finish bottom. Resulting in relegation to the Hellenic League.

After 3 seasons in the Hellenic League, finishing fifth, third and again third in 1998/99. the club won both the Premier Division title and the League Cup. Therefore, gaining promotion back to the Southern Football League. The 2006/07 season saw us achieve our highest league position. Finishing 3rd and thus qualifying for the end of season Promotion Play-Off semi-final. Unfortunately losing to the eventual winners – Swindon Supermarine.

The 2012-2013 season was, without doubt, the most successful in the football club's history. The First Team won the Evo Stik League Southern Division One Central (Southern League) championship. Earning promotion to the newly sponsored Calor League Premier Division (Southern League), while our Reserves won the UHLSPORT Hellenic League Division Two East championship at the first time of asking. Earning promotion to Division One East where they came up against the First Teams of many of the previous season's opposition.

CUP COMPETITION HISTORY

In cup competitions Burnham reached the Quarter Final of the FA Vase in 1977/78 and then went one better in reaching the Semi Final in 1982/83. Losing 4-2 over two legs to Halesowen Town. The clubs record attendance of 2400 was achieved in the home leg. We have twice reached the Third Qualifying round of the FA Cup and in 2005/06 we reached the First Round Proper for the first time ever, before losing at home to Aldershot Town. In the F.A.Trophy we reached the Fourth Round (the last 16) in 1999/2000. Before losing to Scarborough in a replay after a creditable 1-1 draw at The Gore. In the Berks & Bucks Senior Cup we reached the Semi Final twice before losing on both occasions to Chesham United.

On the 22nd May 2024 the blues were successful in beating Virginia Water 2-1 at the Racecourse Ground (Ascot United) and won the 2023/24 Combined Counties Football League / Cherry Red Records Premier Challenge Cup, aka the League Cup.

AND NOW...

Burnham FC now play in the Cherry Red Records Combined Counties Premier League North. During the Covid-19 pandemic the renamed 1878 stadium and its facilities have undergone a major refurbishment programme. Providing the new chairman, Glenn Skivington, with the chance to achieve one of his key objectives of building closer links with local clubs and the local community. We now have more teams, more clubs and more leagues enjoying the state of the art 3G pitch which was completed in July 2021. Going forward Burnham Football Club will continue to develop as a local sports facility. Creating a pathway for young players, whether they want to play professionally or build a career within the sports industry.

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History of Egham Town FC

Egham Town's forerunners were a team called Runnymede Rovers who were established in 1877 and played in red and white - colours the present club have now adopted as their own. Rovers were reformed as Egham FC in 1905 and were founder members of the Surrey Senior League, claiming the inaugural Championship. The club had an unsuccessful six-year spell in the Spartan League between 1927-33 before returning to the Surrey Senior League, in which they played until disbanding upon the outbreak of World War II. Unlike many clubs, Egham FC did not reform at the end of the War and it was not until a public meeting at the town's Literary Institute on December 9, 1963 that the present club came into being. The local council offered the use of part of a recreation ground for the new club to play on and this remains the club's home, although it is now an impressive ground for a club of Egham Town's stature. The former park has been developed into the Runnymede Stadium as it is known today. The ground has cover on all sides. Having played in the Parthenon League in 1964-65 season, Town returned to the Surrey Senior League in 1965, and then moved back into the Spartan League, claiming the title in 1971-72. They were then elected to the Athenian League and captured the Second Division Championship at the first attempt in 1974-75 and finishing as First Division runners-up the following season. When the Isthmian League expanded in 1977, the Sarnies were elected but after finishing 6th in their first season success always eluded them. They have reached the fourth round of the FA Vase once in their history - the 1984-85 season. They narrowly missed promotion from the final season of the regionalised Division Two in 1990-91, when what was Divisions Two North and South was reorganised for the following season as Two and Three. Egham finished third in Division Two South with a tally of 87 points and 100 goals - both would have been good enough in almost any other season to secure one of the two promotion spots. In that season, they also had the best ever run in the FA Cup, reaching the 4th Qualifying Round before losing at Telford United. The 1991-92 season saw the Sarnies reach the Finals of the Surrey Senior Cup and Loctite Trophy but lose both. The club then went into a decline that culminated in relegation from Division Two of the Isthmian League in 1997-98.

For season 1991-92 the Club was promoted to Division One South of the Isthmian League as part of a re-organisation of non-league football and in 1997-98 were relegated to Isthmian Division 3. That started badly with a 0-9 defeat at Camberley Town. We were switched to the Southern League in 2004, which proved disastrous, as the travelling and a small budget virtually guaranteed bottom place, with 22 points. With a final placing of sixth in season 2001-2 Egham were in one the allocated places for a move to Isthmian One South, that achievement helped largely by the goalscoring exploits of Clayton Whittle, who ended the season with a run of at least a goal a game for the last ten games, setting a club record. In the 2005-06 season they played in the Isthmian League Division Two but, as a result of the restructuring of non-league football, the club entered the Combined Counties League Premier Division. For the next six seasons results were not too bad, the goalscoring feats of Jamie Thornby, John Pomroy and Dale Marvell keeping the fans excited. Season 2012-13 started with the club expecting to progress under the management of John Hamsher and Wayne Noad, but they left for Chipstead after just ten games. Hamsher and Noad jumped ship to join Ryman One South side Chipstead, taking half a dozen players with them. The vacant managerial slot was taken by Lee Pasmore, who rejoined the club last season after spending some of his earlier career with the Sarnies but was badly injured in the opening game of season 2012-13 at Sandhurst Town. He called on the services of former boss Jack McKinlay, who was joined in his return by another former player, Neerav Patel. Thereafter the season just got better and better, with some fantastic performances against Windsor, Cove, Badshot Lea and a memorable 3-1 home win against eventual runners-up Guernsey seeing the Sarnies creep up the table before taking up residence in first place. Appalling weather disrupted every club's preparations, especially those of the Channel Islanders, but Egham were relentlessly picking up points and set a club record of 14 straight home wins before collapsing inexplicably by 1-6 to relegation threatened Hartley Wintney. That gave Guernsey hope. They had to finish the season with four games in as many days after season-long issues with their pitch, but even though they managed a 12 point haul, including an 8-1 win over the same Hartley Wintney side which had caught Egham cold, the Championship was won on 4 May 2013 with a 1-0 win (Luke Muldowney, 79th minute) against Bedfont Sports. Among the wild celebrations there was also time to reflect on the loss, early in the season, of Club President Brian Askew, who had been involved with the club since its reformation and had held several positions throughout his time with his beloved Sarnies. Season 2013-14 saw a vibrant Egham Town looking forward to the challenge of football back in the Southern League, much better prepared than in 2004-05, aiming initially to better their previous mark in the Southern League, which was achieved fairly comfortably. Despite the clubhouse, the pitch and the surrounding area being badly flooded for weeks on end the club spirit held and in a very competitive division the final finish of 11th, and a run to the Semi Final of the Surrey Senior Cup, left the Sarnies in a confident mood to tackle season 2014 – 2015.

Egham Town were shaken on 4 October 2014 when Lee Passmore resigned his post as manager for personal reasons. Muldowney took over as boss, but unfortunately this only lasted 21 matches as after two heavy defeats and with the club sliding down the table a change was required. Egham Town were next managed by Koo Dumbuya, a very well-respected coach who used to play for the Sarnies. He was assisted by Trevor Norris, father of goalkeeper Jamie, and in his own right a manager and coach with a very impressive track record. The Sarnies progressed to the Semi-Finals of the Red Insure Cup. Wins against Slough Town, Godalming Town and Burnham (5-4 on penalties) preceded the defeat North Greenford United 2-1 at home before travelling to Premier Division leaders and Premier Division promotion challengers Poole Town. Goals from Mitchell Gutteridge and Reis Stanislaus saw Egham run the Dorset side close, Poole only securing their 3-2 win with three minutes to go. 2015-2016 had an unsettled start, before the appointment of exciting young manager Gary Meakin. Two games in Meakin guided Egham to a club record away win as they walloped Uxbridge 7-0, then recorded the same score 11 days later at Arlesey Town. Egham recorded their first ever win on the road in the FA Trophy with a 1-0 success at Slimbridge, where earlier the Sarnies went out 2-3 aet in an FA Cup replay. In that replay Egham only had 11 players, and had to field leading scorer Brendan Matthew in goal! Egham reached half way in the 2015-2016 season in 3rd place after successive 1-0 wins against promotion rivals St Ives Town and AFC Rushden & Diamonds coming just before Christmas. The season finished with the club going into the last day with everything on a knife edge. Egham were in third place when they travelled to Royston Town. Both sides were on 82 points, two behind leaders Kings Langley. When Egham took the lead the Sarnies were champions, for all of eleven minutes. Then a combination of Royston levelling and Kings Langley scoring the only goal of their game at Petersfield Town meant that the club finished third and faced St Ives Town in the play-offs. The Sarnies took the lead twice but with the score at 2-2 after extra time the visitors prevailed 4-2 in the penalty shoot-out. Finishing in third place was a superb end to a thoroughly entertaining season in which leading marksman Brendan Matthew scored a magnificent 37 times. The following season did not run quite as smoothly but an excellent late push moved the club into fifth place and a play-off at Farnborough. A 0-4 reverse was harsher than was deserved but the Sarnies were looking forward to another season under Gary Meakin and another promotion challenge. That didn't happen as he and his management compadres jumped ship to helm the newly renamed Beaconsfield Town.

History of Egham Town FC - continued

Season 2017-2018 began with the experienced of Chris Moore and Wayne Carter in charge. Moore's first managerial post saw him hang up his boots and use his contacts to bring in some decent players, and a five-game winning run early on had Egham looking good in 3rd place. A club record FA Trophy win (7-1 at home to Shoreham) was followed by a drawn-out saga with Bowers & Pitsea, who ended up being thrown out of the competition. Form dipped and after 36 games the pair were replaced with former Northwood boss Simon Lane. An exodus of players followed, mainly to Beaconsfield, who actively courted former Sarnies to boost their successful promotion run. Results were variable under the new manager, (1-7 at Hartley Wintney; wins at home against AFC Rushden & Diamonds and Hayes & Yeading United played off against a home loss to doomed Arlesey Town). The final position of 16th was well short of early expectations.

Season 2018-2019 saw Egham Town re-discover what it was like to be an Isthmian League side after 12 years after the FA's massive reorganisation of the non-league structure. Simon Lane was pleased to start the season with a good selection of the previous season's squad but leading marksman Matthew's signing for Beaconsfield Town was as inevitable as night following day. With the start of the season not producing the performances or results required, Lane left by mutual consent. Assistant manager Ashley Smith took over, with a home FA Cup First Qualifying tie against local rivals Staines Town his baptism of fire. Kezie Ibe's goal gave The Sarnies a local derby win. An excellent home performance in the Second Qualifying round, against another Step 3 side, Brightlingsea Regent, saw Egham draw 3-3, but lose the replay. Smith called in a number of loan players from higher rated clubs but unfortunately the results did not match some encouraging performances. After a loss at Bedfont Sports he resigned with the club sitting in 19th place in Bostik South Central. Next up was Dickson Gill, who had two previous spells in the manager's seat, but his third stint was nothing short of a disaster, garnering only 3 points out of 42. In came Carl Palmer, and some respectability was restored, but the club were relegated a record of: P38 W 4 L 6 L28 F29 A94 Pts 18, the Sarnies' lowest points total ever. While recording decent results against the top five sides the opposite was true when facing sides down the wrong end of the table. Relegation was sealed with a loss at Hertford Town. The club returned to the Combined Counties League Premier Division. Another heavy defeat, 1-6 at home to Balham, left the club in bottom place and led to another managerial change. Palmer was replaced by the experienced Tony Choules, who had led Uxbridge for several years. The club sat in 10th place when Covid struck. Season 2020-2021 lasted only 13 CCL games for The Sarnies, who were 13th when the lockdown came again.

On Tuesday 4 May 2021 Egham Town FC were presented with a threat to their very existence when the latest of a series of attacks by local vandals saw the Brian Askew Stand completely burnt out. The fire, which needed three fire tenders to extinguish, also damaged the dressing rooms behind the party wall, and could not have come at a worse time for a club that, like so many others, had suffered during the Coronavirus pandemic. It was not the way the club wanted to get on the front page of the local paper! The response was immediate, with fans Bradley Graham, Mike O'Grady and Andy Hughes launching a Go Fund Me page that attracted over £5k in about a week and in total £8462. Money and messages of support came from former players and managers, and from the football community far and wide.

From the ashes arose a new and improved stand, named after Brian Askew and Jimmy Hughes. Brian was aa long-serving committee member who died in 2013 and had been with us in various positions since the early days of a club formed in 1963. Jimmy Hughes, brother of Andy, passed away in 2020 after a period of illness. Jimmy had been the cheerful chap manning the turnstile for many years. One of the awful things that the vandals had done in an earlier attack was to damage a plaque placed by the entrance commemorating Jimmy. The club then had another shock as Choules and his management team resigned with the club looking forward to making a positive impact in the newly formed Cherry Red Records Combined Counties League Premier Division (North). Former player Jordan Berry took the reins, recruiting two men who had been at the club under Meakin. Assistant manager Greg Phillips and coach Dave Rogers rejoined, the trio putting together a team that reached the fourth round of the FA Vase (and in winning five matches outdoing their 84-85 run), and finished third in CCL Premier (North). Just one club left Runnymede Stadium with all three points, runaway champions Hanworth Villa, and that with the only goal of the game. Season 2022-23 was another good one for the Sarnies. We again reached the FA Vase Fourth Round, made it to the semi-finals of the Surrey Senior Cup and, with seven wins out of the last eight games, maintained consistent league form to grab a play-off place with two games to spare. That play-off was lost 1-3 to Merstham, and soon afterwards Jordan Berry left the club for Harrow Borough, taking several players with him.

The Sarnies recruited Manny Williams and Jay Gasson to lead them into season 2023-2024, both having a good pedigree as players at Step 4 and above. Unfortunately, this did not go quite as planned, and after a haul of four points from the first 15, and an early FA Cup exit, they were dismissed. A decent run under new boss Harrison Williams (ex-Redhill, South Park) was difficult to maintain as Williams' work and personal commitments had to come first. Yet again the club appointed from within, defender Ben Peden and midfielder Adam Humphries steering the club to a safe, if unspectacular (13 draws!), 13th place.

As season 2024-2025 loomed, there was a surprise in store for the Sarnie faithful as Jordan Berry (and several of Harrow's players, including skipper Reece Yorke) left Harrow (relegated) and pledged their allegiance to Egham Town. Off the field, Chairman Pat Bennett stepped aside, his sons Dan and Steve taking joint ownership of the role. Pat is now the President of the club. The move has rejuvenated the Sarnies, who have expanded their outlook regarding media involvement while upgrading the clubhouse and dressing rooms. Youth involvement has been positively encouraged and a Ladies Team has been established. Berry has been able to get some experienced players to sign, or re-sign, for Egham, and the expectations are high again at the Runnymede Stadium.





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Blues Talk - Are artificial pitches the way forward?

The quality of the playing surface is one of the most important things in football, it can be the difference between a fast paced match and slow, laborious play that ultimately ends up with a freak goal or injury. Most clubs pride themselves on the quality of their pitches, and hire top groundskeepers to keep it as pristine as possible. Recently, the debate about the use of artificial pitches instead of natural grass has come up, which has raised the question: are artificial pitches the way forward?

Artificial pitches have been used as far back as the 1980s, with <u>Queens Park Rangers</u>, <u>Luton Town</u>, <u>Oldham Athletic</u> and <u>Preston North End</u> installing them at their stadiums throughout the decade. Fully artificial pitches were banned in the Football League in 1989, and have been ever since, however many National League clubs now play on artificial surfaces.

The benefits of artificial pitches are obvious. They don't get ruined by extreme weather conditions, be it heavy rain, snow or drought, they can be used much more than natural surfaces, and they don't require large amounts of maintenance. You would think that these would be the obvious choice, so one has to wonder why the Football League are still hesitant to allow them to be installed at stadiums.

Critics say that artificial pitches can change the bounce and movement of the ball on the ground. Although this isn't always apparent in games that take place on artificial surfaces, in a more intense, fast-paced game it could potentially make a difference. This does depend on the team's style of play however, so it may not be an issue for everyone.

Hybrid pitches are currently allowed and in operation in the Football League. These consist of a mixture of natural grass and synthetic fibers, which helps the pitch to stay intact during heavy usage. The Etihad Stadium and Wembley Stadium are among those who use these hybrid pitches. Coventry City have had to postpone their first three home games this season due to an "unsafe" pitch, after the CBS Stadium was used for Rugby 7s matches during the Commonwealth Games this summer. They are currently installing a hybrid pitch to make it playable again.

To answer the question "are artificial pitches the way forward?" you would need to look at the finance and resources of clubs throughout the Football League structure. While it is a large cost to install artificial or hybrid pitches, they are more hardy than their natural grass equivalent. This means the maintenance costs would be lower and more events can take place on it. Whereas for Premier League and 'richer' clubs throughout the structure, they can afford to maintain the natural grass pitches that are currently required. There are still the same issues, mainly weather, but they can be managed and dealt with if needed. Although it's unlikely the Football League will change their stance in the near future, it's still an important conversation for the top dogs to have.

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
